

Bees, Pats win championships

Like the song says, two out of three ain't bad.

Northeast dropped a nine-inning decision in the Class A title game Saturday but that defeat couldn't darken the brightest day Anne Arundel County scholastic athletics has ever seen, as Old Mill and Brooklyn Park culminated great seasons by claiming state baseball championships.

Old Mill played possibly its sloppiest game of the year at Dundalk Community College, but none of the Patriots' previous wins was as sweet as the 4-3 one over

Kenwood in the Class AA final.

Brooklyn Park no-hit for nearly five innings by Sparrows Point pitcher Willie Hughes got a pair of run-scoring doubles from Jack Turek in a come-from-behind, eight-inning 4-2 victory in the Class B contest at Catonsville.

When Northeast scored three runs in the top of the sixth inning to tie its Class A battle with Charles W. Woodward, it appeared that the Eagles would gut out a win.

But it was Woodward that chipped away for a run in the bottom of the ninth inning and a 4-3 victory, denying Northeast its first state championship since 1975, and

the county the sweep it wanted so badly.

Old Mill and Brooklyn Park teams that established themselves as the county's best in mid-April, were winning state baseball crowns for the first time. It's been 16 years since Brooklyn Park took a state team sports title. For Old Mill, it was its first state crown in a sport other than track and field.

Mel Montgomery's Old Mill club felt the pressure of the state finals, as did Kenwood, as the two Class AA clubs bobbled their way through their game.

Gary Diagostino, who pitched a four-hitter, overcame muggy weather and a succession of errors, balks, passed balls,

and questionable umpiring decisions, to win the Patriots to state honors.

A passed ball helped Kenwood score its first run, but the Patriots went ahead with two runs in the bottom of the first inning and the little lefthander was in control the rest of the way.

His best inning was the seventh. Diagostino struck out the first and third batters, and got the second to ground out as he hastily capped Old Mill's best season ever.

Typical of the day's events were the circumstances surrounding Old Mill's eventual winning run. The fourth Patriot score came in the fourth inning on a bases-loaded walk to Mike Owens, who had replaced Sonny Dean when the first baseman was ejected.

Dean had the big hit for Old Mill in the first inning, after the Bluebirds took advantage of Patriot blunders to grab a 1-0 lead. Kenwood's first batter, Mark Resh, struck out, but reached on a passed ball. He scored when Mark Hetterman's single to left was bootied by Buddy Cahill.

In the Old Mill first, Tyrone Queen singled and Ed Wojciechowski walked, before Dean's two-run double to right-centerfield. The Patriots made it 3-1 in the third, when Craig Dorsey scored an unearned run on a single by Pete Delpiore.

Kenwood got an unearned run in the fourth inning, but Old Mill returned the lead to two runs in the same frame on successive walks to Dorsey and Owens, the latter with the bases loaded.

The Bluebirds scratched for another tainted tally in the fifth, but Diagostino, who fanned eight and walked one, bore down and improved his final record to 12-1, Old Mill's to a glittering 20-2.

"It wasn't very artistic. With all of the pressure, our kids were a little tight. We wanted to show people how good we are, and I was upset that we couldn't do that. But we got tough when we had to. I feel very happy for our kids," said Montgomery, who needed just two years to take Old Mill to the top.

Brooklyn Park also got tough when it had to. Going into the top of the sixth inning, the Bees trailed Sparrows Point, 2-0. Hughes, the Pointers' ace pitcher, had

allowed just three baserunners in the first five innings, two on walks and the other on a single by Rusty Cadden in the fifth.

Brian Raska, a junior who bats ninth for the Bees, walked to open the sixth, and stole second. Turek, a clutch hitter, ripped a double down the rightfield line that the first baseman touched.

Turek stopped at third on Craig Stump's line single to left. The Bees tied it when first baseman Gary Gribble fumbled a grounder by his counterpart, Ned Carey. Turek was running with the pitch, and scored easily as Gribble's only play was the putout of Carey.

Raska got things going again in the eighth, with a bunt single. A sacrifice by Tim Krysiak advanced Raska, who raced in with the winning run when Turek stroked another double, this time to the fence in right-center.

When Carey drove in Turek with a double to almost the same spot, the Bees began celebrating. Pitcher Dean Albany was in a strong groove, after some early-inning problems.

"When Turek got the tying run in the sixth, that gave us momentum, and we felt we were going to win. Albany retired the last eight batters he faced, and none of them hit a ball out of the infield," said Tim McMullen, Brooklyn Park's ninth-year coach.

Albany gave up three singles in the first inning, as Sparrows Point went on top on a hit by Hughes. Albany escaped a bases-loaded jam without any further damage, but the Pointers increased their lead in the fourth, as Dave Kron sent an RBI single to center.

But the Bees, with Raska and Turek leading the way, finally solved Hughes. Brooklyn Park, which finished 18-4, has gotten clutch hitting all season, and no one has more key hits than Turek.

"Good athletes like to perform in difficult moments. Jack Turek likes to bat in key situations. He's the best clutch hitter I've ever coached," said McMullen.

Northeast spotted Woodward three runs in the second inning, before battling back in the top of the sixth. But the rally only put off the inevitable, however, as John Sood, the designated hitter who had been retired by Catfish Smith four straight times, singled in the winning run with two outs in the bottom of the ninth inning.

Smith, who had pitched a no-hitter in the semifinals, was less than overpowering and struggled the whole way.

The Northeast pitcher nearly got out of a bases-loaded, no-out squeeze in the second, getting two outs on fielder's choice force plays at the plate. But Ken Berryman laced a two-run single past Eagle third baseman Tom Gable, and the third Woodward run scored on an error by Jeff Marsh, the second baseman.

Steve Becvar limited Northeast to two singles in the first five innings. Marsh led off the sixth with a booming double up the left-center alley, and scored on a bad-hop single by catcher Dave Myers.

Gable tripled to right, scoring Myers, and came in with the tying run when Mike D'Antonio flied to right. Northeast had runners in scoring position the next two innings, but the Eagles couldn't push another run across.

"When we came back in the sixth, I thought we were in real good shape. Everyone was disappointed when we couldn't get another run, especially our seniors, but I'm very proud of the way we played. We had a good season, it's just a shame we couldn't end it with a win," said Northeast coach Harry Lentz.



Little takes LPGA tourney

MASON, Ohio (AP) — Sally Little has quit two old losing habits, scoreboard watching and self-pressure.

As a result, the tall, slender South African was toasting her first major title Sunday night. Her new loose style produced a victory in the Ladies Professional Golf Association Championship.

"I didn't look at the scoreboard the last few holes. I've had problems with that in the past and gave it one of these," said Little, clutching her throat in a choking gesture.

"I have a new attitude — just go out and play. I had been putting too much pressure on myself. I can't do that. I couldn't draw the club back," she said.

Little beat the winds of the Nicklaus Golf Center Grizzly's course so well she was the lone player in the field under par.

Her 73-285 was three under and three shots ahead of runnerup Jane Blalock.

"That wind was unbelievable. I made a couple of mental mistakes, but so did everyone else. It's a miracle, isn't it?" she asked the media afterward.

"Sally Little was just too tough today," said Blalock, the lone golfer at par 288 after shooting 74 on a day when the gusting, swirling winds reached 30 mph.

"I don't recall three days — really four days — when it really blew like heck. I'm mentally and physically exhausted," said Blalock, who earned \$14,700.

Little collected \$22,500 with her sixth American tour victory in 10 years. She qualified for the World Series of Women's Golf in September in Cleveland.

"I just tried to shoot one or two under par today," Little said, explaining her final round strategy. "I thought the scores would be high."

Once she took the lead with a birdie at the fifth hole, the 28-year-old veteran was never behind. But what appeared to be a comfortable three-shot edge over Blalock dwindled to one stroke on the 12th hole.


Little missed the green and settled for a bogey four. Blalock birdied the hole. However, Little's chief contender caught consecutive bogeys at 13 and 14. The race was over.

Defending champion Donna Caponi Young, the leading money-winner in 1980, closed with a 72 and finished in a five-way tie for third at 289.

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Sailing

This weekend the Snipe Class killed two birds with one stone as they held two regattas simultaneously. The Severn Sailing Association hosted both the North Eastern Championship and the Colonial Regatta. Both events were for Snipes which are two person boats. The Colonial Regatta had already been scheduled but the Snipes still needed a place for their championship so they chose the Severn Sailing Association.

Both events had the same races but used separate scoring and awarded separate trophies. The North Eastern Championship was a three-day event, and the Colonial Regatta was two days. The North Easterns started on Friday and had 32 boats racing. These boats were automatically entered in the Colonial Regatta which started on Saturday and had a total of 41 boats participating. Greg and Patty Fisher of Columbus, Ohio won both events.

A variety of sailing conditions prevailed as the weather ranged from high winds and choppy seas to light and shifty breezes. Yesterday's race was cancelled because the wind was blowing more than 25 knots; the Snipe Class has a rule which sets 25 knots as the maximum wind strength for racing.

Saturday two races were sailed in light wind, 5-10 knots, and were slow compared to Friday's racing. The first race on Friday was in light and shifty winds and had a lot of waves. By the middle of Friday's second race the wind had picked up to more than 20 knots. One boat sank and several others dropped out. The boat that sank belonged to Lu Burns of Newport, Rhode Island and was brand new. According to Ike Lawton, race chairman, Burn's boat sank as the result of a manufacturing defect that allowed water to get into the air tanks. Burns managed to participate in Saturday's racing however.

The sailors I spoke with were very enthusiastic about the sailing conditions and thought the racing had been fun although wet at times. I felt that the sailors who dropped out of Friday's second race had exercised good common sense as their reasons ranged from not having a self-rescuing boat to not having sails suited to

50-1 shot wins Belmont

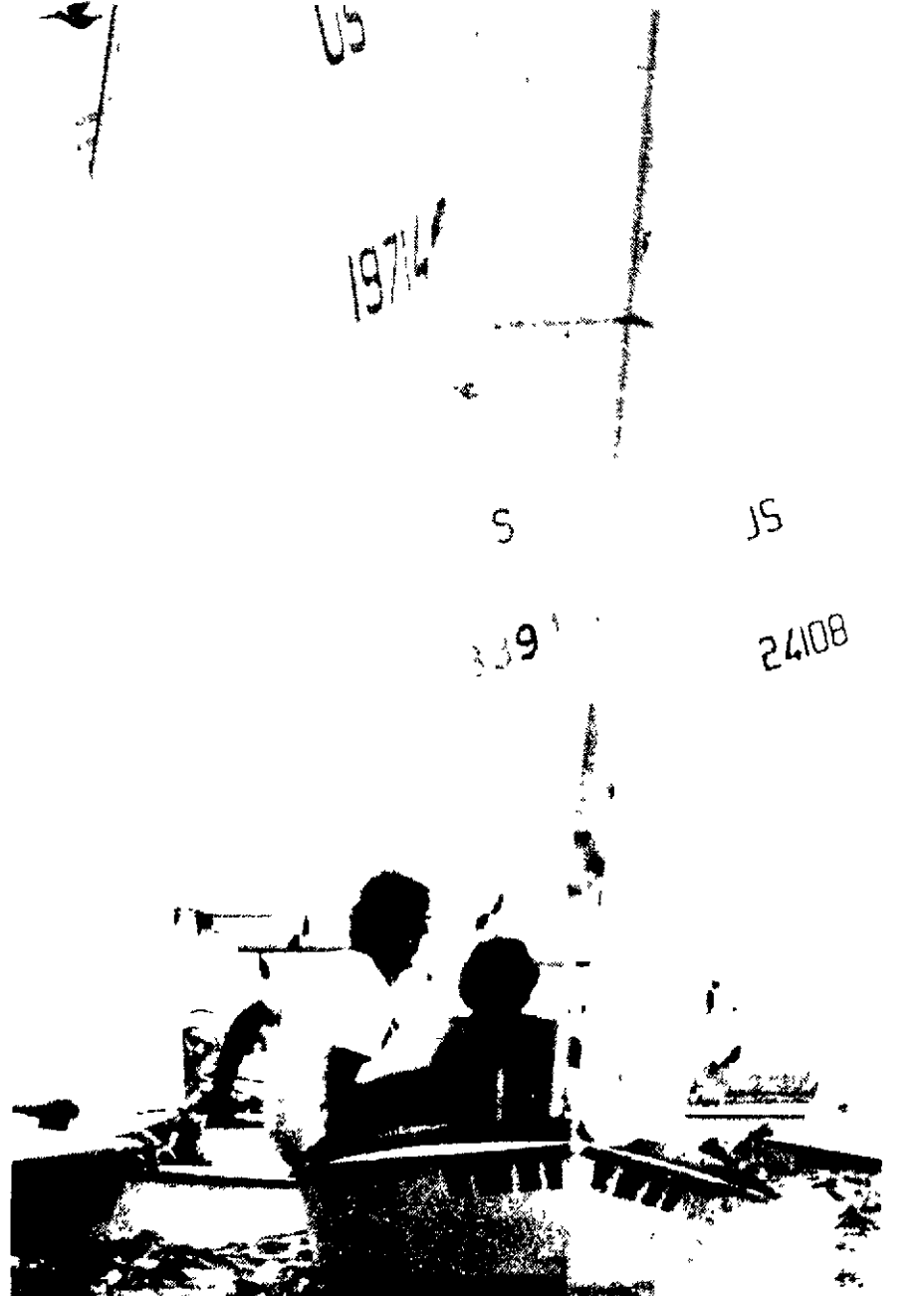
NEW YORK (AP) — "This horse, in my opinion, had no business to be a 50-1 shot, if for no other reason, than someone had the confidence to put up \$20,000," said John Ed Anthony.

But the crowd of 58,090 at Belmont Park Saturday for the Belmont Stakes was less swayed by the \$20,000 put up by Anthony to supplement Temperence Hill into the final race of the Triple Crown than they were by Temperence Hill's three straight losses and his opposition which included Genuine Risk, Codex and Rumbo.

The crowd also had to be aware of Temperence Hill's dismal fifth-place performance as the 3-5 favorite in the Pennsylvania Derby May 26.

So when Temperence Hill broke from the gate with nine other 3-year-olds in the 1 1/4-mile Belmont he was 53-1. The crowd roared in anticipation of the duel between the Genuine Risk, the filly who had won the Derby, and Codex, the colt who scored a controversial win over her in the Preakness.

With a quarter of a mile remaining, Rockhill Native, the beaten favorite in the Kentucky Derby, was a half-length in front of Genuine Risk ... and there was Temperence Hill third only a head back. Codex, the 8-5 favorite, was fourth and fading. He finished seventh. Rumbo, the 9-5 second choice, was fifth and that's where he would finish.
